A Message from the CEO and Board of Directors

The 2016-2017 program year was a time of great change. Nationally, a new President was elected bringing new ideas on the role of the Federal government and uncertainty regarding regulations and program funding. At the state and local level, Pennsylvania's gaming legislation was determined unconstitutional causing state legislators to attempt to draft new legislation and raising questions on how and if that money will be distributed at a local level.

Within GECAC we also experienced significant change with the passing of CEO Ronald A. Steele on October 14, 2016. Mr. Steele left a lasting legacy here at GECAC and within the Erie community at large through his twelve years as GECAC CEO and twentyfour years at the County in the Juvenile Probation and Public Defender's office. Countless individuals have Mr. Steele to thank for the positive changes that they found in their lives.

The changes continued in early 2017 when we both stepped into new roles as the new CEO and incoming Board Chairperson of GECAC. While neither of us is new in our involvement with GECAC, we are new to these roles and are extremely grateful to the support shared by the staff, Board of Directors and other supporters in allowing us to have a seamless and successful transition.

Throughout all the change and uncertainty, many things stayed the same - namely the needs and successes of the individuals we serve and the dedication of our staff who assist them in meeting those needs and achieving those successes. Once again this year, we chose to feature five of those individuals within this annual report.

Within the pages of this annual report, you will read about Malcolm who after spending seventeen years in federal prison found the Getting Ahead program and with the support of his case manager and mentor is now employed with full benefits making a living wage. You'll also read about Rachel and Trenton. With the support of the Head Start program, this mother and son duo will both be reaching educational milestones this year when Trenton heads off to school kindergarten-ready and Rachel graduates from Penn State Behrend with a nursing degree. Joining Malcom, Rachel and Trenton are Harry, Carol and Henry – each of whom have reached milestones with the support of GECAC staff and programs.



Harry Fornalczyk RSVP Program

This past year, the national and local media shone a spotlight on the 12th Street corridor. But while the cameras rolled on the many manufacturing buildings along that stretch of roadway – some thriving, some vacant – and the conversation focused on the successes and challenges of Erie's manufacturing history, one story was left untold...

Nestled behind Erie Press Systems, is a woodworking workshop rivaled only by the one at the North Pole. For the past 30 years this workshop has been home to dozens of Santa's Helpers who volunteer year round to design, build and decorate over 3400 wooden toys each year for approximately 2500 underprivileged children at Christmas.

During 27 of those 30 years, Harry Fornalczyk

has been a faithful Santa's Helper volunteer and leader, serving fourteen years as a station manager. Harry joined GECAC's Retired and Senior Volunteer Program, better known as RSVP, in January 1990. While Harry joined RSVP in 1990, his service to our country and community did not start there. At a very young age, Harry joined the Air Force during World War II and became a Second Lieutenant/Navigator on a B-24 flying crew. Harry's crew was shot down and was captured by the Germans where he served as a prisoner of war. Harry was freed after the camp was liberated. Returning to the states, Harry worked as a contractor. After retirement, Harry joined RSVP because he "had nothing to do after retirement."

> Harry has contributed over 10,000 hours to the Santa's Helpers project. During many years, Harry's volunteer hours were equivalent to or more than the hours a regular full time employee would work. He has been a significant contributor to the growth of the program, pushing for funding to grow the capacity of the site, recruiting additional volunteers and working with Erie Press Systems to continue to foster that relationship.

> At the age of 93, the hours Harry serves may

not be as many as they once were, but he continues to put in more than 750 hours each year. According to Harry, volunteering "gives me a feeling of accomplishment to be able to do something for the community. I was an actual Prisoner of War (POW) in the Air Force so I was given a second chance. I'm happy to be here. I have been very fortunate and blessed in my life, and I just want to give something back."



Child Development

Recognizing that a lifetime of success can be built during the earliest years, GECAC's Child Development Division focuses on the education of our county's youngest children – those birth to age five – through three main programs: Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership, Head Start and Pre-K Counts.

Rachel & Trenton Weryha Head Start

One of the key milestones in any child's life is entering school kindergartenready. As a single parent, working and going to school full time to become a nurse, Rachel Weryha knew her son Trenton's education was extremely important but also didn't have a lot of free time to teach him herself or the funds to pay for preschool. That's when Rachel learned about GECAC Head Start, a free preschool program for children aged three to five.

Rachel enrolled Trenton in Head Start mid-school year when he was four years old and immediately met with Trenton's teaching team, Sherri Letzelter and Deb Buettner. Upon entering the program Trenton was only able to recognize his colors and had not had much opportunity to socialize with children his age.

Ms. Letzelter and Ms. Buettner assisted Trenton with learning the ins and outs of making friends and playing alongside his classmates. Trenton was able to successfully make friends and enjoyed playing with them each day.

Trenton's teachers also planned individualized activities to help Trenton become kindergarten-ready academically. Trenton was eager to learn and worked very hard on all the tasks his teachers planned for him. He very quickly began to recognize letters, learned to spell and write his name, identified rhyming words, and counted the number of syllables in words. Trenton took pride in his work and was very proud of his accomplishments. At one point, he told his mom that he "could never miss any school!"

All of Trenton's success was not just from his time in the classroom. The classroom teaching team would often make suggestions as to how his mom could work with Trenton at home on new skills. They let Rachel know that working with Trenton for just 10 minutes a day would help him immensely.

⁶⁶ GECAC Head Start laid a great foundation for Trenton's future education. ⁹⁹ Even though she had an extremely busy schedule and was working very hard on her own schooling and to support her family, she always made time for Trenton. Rachel would work with Trenton at home any time she could, and this is one of the greatest reasons for his successes!

At the final parent/teacher conference of the school year, the teaching team and Rachel agreed that Trenton had truly flourished, learned many new skills, and was going to be prepared for kindergarten.

"GECAC Head Start laid a great foundation for Trenton's future education, acting as a stepping stone for him before entering public school," explained Rachel. "It helped him to truly enjoy learning."

Trenton began kindergarten in the fall of 2017 at Robison Elementary. Rachel is expected to graduate in May 2018 with a nursing degree from Penn State Behrend.

Carol Madison Weatherization Program

Carol Madison applied to the GECAC Weatherization program hoping to gain assistance with implementing cost saving energy conservation measures in her home. She shared with the weatherization team that she spent several years in the home caring for her sister who was battling cancer. After the loss of her sister, Carol inherited her sister's home in May 2016 and began seeking assistance to lower her utility bills.

"I was trying to address the bitter cold weather conditions I was experiencing in my home. I knew the home needed insulating, but I'm on a fixed income and couldn't afford it," explains Carol. "I reached out to St. Martin's Center who in turn referred me to the GECAC weatherization program."

Carol submitted an application to the GECAC Weatherization program and in March of 2017, began working with the agency. Todd Harvey, Weatherization auditor, states, "After an inspection of Carol's home, we insulated the walls and the attic, air sealed the home, tested

and serviced the furnace to achieve maximum performance at lowest cost, and exchanged some of the light bulbs for energy efficient lighting."

Carol has shared that without the services of the weatherization program, she would not have been able to afford her home's utilities on her fixed income. She has also expressed that she immediately noticed a difference in the home's ability to maintain a comfortable temperature on both cold and warm nights.

⁶⁶I would recommend any and every one to take advantage of the opportunity to participate with GECAC and the weatherization services. ⁹⁹ Like other Erie residents, Carol shares she has benefited greatly from the program. "I'm living more comfortably in my home because of my ability to maintain the temperature in my home through the seasons, especially the winter months. I could have never afforded to complete so much work on my fixed income. I would recommend any and every one to take advantage of the opportunity to participate with GECAC and the weatherization services. I am also seeing a difference in my utility bills."

Carol Madison is one of many Erie City area homeowners that have benefited from the services provided by GECAC's weatherization

program. We look forward to helping more Erie residents like Carol, in an effort of continuing "Helping People and Changing Lives."

Malcolm Toran Getting Ahead

My name is Malcolm Toran, and I am a returning citizen. I spent 17 years in federal prison. I have been out for two years. I was convicted at age 25 of dealing drugs and was released in 2015. I began attending the GECAC Getting Ahead class in January 2016.

Since attending this program I have achieved the following accomplishments: got a job, got a driver's license, got a better job, reconnected with my father and my son, bought a car and joined the union. And, oh yes, I moved out from my Aunt's house and now rent my own apartment.

I now receive health benefits that I earn and pay for at my current employer, Liberty Iron and Metal. I also contribute to a retirement

fund through work and the union to make possible a retirement for myself at some point. I can now see a future for myself and have the confidence and ability to plan for it. None of this would have come about without the help of my mentor who was assigned to me in the Getting Ahead Program. His name is Mike Bizzarro, and he is about 23 years old. Mike helped me get my job at Liberty where I now earn \$17 an hour. Mike helped me stay on the straight

⁶⁶I can now see a future for myself and have the confidence and ability to plan for it. ⁹⁹ and narrow and showed me how to not let my temper get the better of me. He helped me keep my job when others were being let go by urging me to take on new duties and responsibilities and to learn new skills so that I would be less likely to be laid off.

As far as future plans, my goal is to buy my first house and through Getting Ahead, I have been made aware of some very nice first time home buyers programs available in Erie. Mike

helps me keep a budget and stick to it. I think owning my own house could become a reality for me.

Henry Sekula Senior Community Service and Employment Program

Henry Sekula is a veteran who initially participated in the Senior Community Service and Employment Program (SCSEP) back in 2013 before exiting the program to employment as a meat cutter in a local deli in Erie. Life for Henry was interrupted when he lost that job in March 2016. Remembering the support he'd received previously from GECAC SCSEP Henry, came to

our office to reapply later that same month. At the time there were no enrollment openings, so Henry was placed on the wait list following the program's enrollment priority guidelines. On June 23, 2016, Henry was eligible for re-enrollment and was placed in a training position at the Community of Caring Shelter for the Homeless as a kitchen aide.

During Henry's re-enrollment, *l* Sandra Hansbrew, SCSCEP Project Director, recalls this impactful moment:

Henry and I were nearly done with his enrollment paperwork so I began to inform Henry of his schedule and upcoming training assignment at the Community of Caring Shelter. That's when that magical moment took place – the moment when as project director, I just knew this training would be a perfect fit for him. Henry said, 'Ms. Sandy, I lived at this shelter for a brief period of time and would like to give back to this shelter.'

⁶⁶ Iam grateful for all the help I received from Sandy and Glen at GECAC. They not only helped me find this job but also taught me the job readiness and interviewing skills that I needed to land the job.⁹⁹ In addition to training, Henry also worked with the SCSEP Job Specialist who assisted him with job search activities related to the food industry. On March 14, 2017 Henry responded to a job posting for a meat cutter at Giant Eagle by completing an online job application. The SCSEP project director provided additional support through a professional contact with a representative of Giant Eagle to inform HR of Henry's

online application. It took some perseverance but on April 12, 2017, after overcoming several obstacles, Henry was hired, completed orientation and began working. To date, Henry is still a valued employee for the Giant Eagle Company.

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
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GECAC Organization Chart







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
